#### Brownsville **Cat Survives Fire, Thanks to Firefighters**

**By Lloyd Mitchell** A cat rescued by firefighters was reunited with its owner after a fire, proving the old saying that "cats have nine lives."

Units found the cat unconscious, covered in soot and ash, while searching the second floor of a two-story, flat roof private residence at 612 Chester Street, between Hegeman and Lott Avenues, around 1 p.m. on Thursday, April 25th.

Firefighters Cordero and Kukulski worked for 15 minutes to help the frightened feline regain consciousness. Onlookers cheered with excitement as the cat began to meow.

Units from the 58th Battalion quickly extinguished fire blowing out of the home's window. Deploying two hose lines, they knocked down the main body of fire, placing the fire under control by 1:45 p.m.



#### **Fire Damages Two Floors of Canarsie Home** By Lloyd Mitchell

Firefighters battled a heavy fire in a private dwelling at 1128 East 87th Street Saturday morning.

Units arrived at the home, located between Avenues K and L, around 4 a.m. on April 27th, where they found fire venting out of the second floor windows. The blaze also left a third floor unit damaged.

About 60 firefighters responded and used two hose lines to extinguish the main body of fire.

There were no injuries, and the fire was placed under control at 4:27 a.m. The FDNY Fire Marshal's Office will determine the cause and origin of the fire.













#### East Flatbush **Man Fatally Shot, Two Suspects in Custody**

NYPD detectives are investigating a fatal shooting that occurred at the intersection of East 54th Street and Church Avenue, within the confines of the 67th Precinct, over the weekend.

Officers arrived at the scene around 8:45 p.m. on Saturday, April 27th, where they found Daequan Buckley, 24, of Flatbush, with multiple gunshot wounds to the abdomen, according to police.

EMS took the victim to Brookdale Hospital where he was later pronounced dead.

Police said two persons of interest were taken into custody.

#### Litter to Glitter Phase 2: From Rockaway Parkway to Remsen Avenue to Church Lane

The 2024 Earth Day Project was an extreme success! The weather was unpredictable but the Leaders Engaging in All-Round Development (LEAD'N), Science and Resilience Institute Canarsie Street Team and Divine Arts Explosion Program (DEAP) made a bold decision to spearhead a very ambitious Earth Day Project on Friday, April 19th.

While some may be discouraged by the state of the community being littered with trash, the group took action to address the environmental problems on Remsen Avenue, between Ditmas Avenue and Avenue D.

The youths were empowered to lead the project. Equipped with garbage bags, trash pickers, gloves and shovels, they divided into two groups and ventured out to remove garbage around the tree pits in the area. The





equipment was sponsored by Jason Stein: Advanced Volunteer Coordinator, NYC Parks Super Stewards. The toughest area was the underpass from which over 10 bags of garbage were removed.

Volunteers also made signs to promote the campaign and engaged with fellow members of the community as they passed by and showed interest in the initiative. A team from Community School District 18 and NYD Community Affairs also stopped by to offer their support!

Jamila Blair, one of the youth volunteers, said, "People often add to what they already see in an environment. A space filled with trash is likely to encourage more people to add litter to that area. By cleaning up the community, I hope to encourage others to do the same and make a clean community the new norm. Great acts are made up of small deeds and with continued support locally and projects such as Litter to Glitter, a cleaner and greener community is within reach."

Once again, we have seen the light, just like Rockaway Parkway and Foster Avenue – the first attempt has its challenges but over time you will see the difference. Phase 2 of the Litter to Glitter Project will have a big impact!

Imagine driving along Remsen Avenue and seeing better infrastructure and flowers on both sides of the street, making the area safer and scenic.

The community's positive feedback was very encouraging and underscored the need to address the conditions in the area. One constituent drove home the importance of addressing the issues by recounting a personal experience of driving along the overpass when an object fell and smashed his windshield.

The team was so encouraged by the opportunity to address this environmental issue that they agreed to return to the site before the scheduled date of September 11th.

The team hopes to remove the tons of liter in the area and get the relevant areas to address the grave ponding issues at the location.

#### Packed Agenda at Monthly Meeting of the 63rd Precinct Community Council

**By Robert Pearl** The 63rd Precinct Community Council meeting convened at Purpose Life Church, at 1895 Flatbush Avenue, on Wednesday, April 24th, a change from its usual location at the John Malone Community Center in Bergen Beach, aiming to encourage broader community participation, with plans to alternate between the two locations.

The gathering commenced with a tribute to the late James Buchanan and Jim Ivaliotis, observing a moment of silence to honor the memories of two esteemed community members, who recently passed away. Their contributions were fondly remembered, underscoring their service and impact.

Despite previous announcements of Deputy Inspector Rachael Kosak's impending departure, the commanding officer was present at the meeting, neighborhood developments, commendations and presentation of the Cop of the Month award.

As Kosak recognized Police Officer John Triano as the Cop of the Month for his outstanding performance in a recent incident, she recounted his heroic story -"A call comes in over the radio, over at Ralph Avenue and Avenue N, for an individual that was stabbed. With a good description of the perp from the victim, they canvassed the area, located the person and made the arrest." Once identified, it was revealed that he was a 35-year old male gang member with 17 prior arrests and 20 warrants. Thankfully, Kosak said, the District Attorney's office requested, and judge granted bail, and he is being held in custody.

Triano's swift response led to the apprehension of a known gang member with numerous outstanding war-

providing her customary updates on crime statistics, rants, effectively removing a significant threat from the streets. His exemplary actions garnered praise not only from within the precinct but also from elected officials, receiving additional citations from State Senators Roxanne Persaud and Kevin Parker, and Assemblywoman Jaime Williams.

Additionally, the promotion of Police Officer Sergio Martins to sergeant was celebrated, highlighting the dedication and professionalism of the precinct's officers.

Following the accolades, Captain Mike Galleta from the Internal Affairs Bureau (IAB) delivered an informative presentation on the bureau's vital role in maintaining the integrity of the NYPD. Attendees gained insights into the bureau's mission to uphold public trust by addressing instances of misconduct and corruption within the department.

Crime statistics shared during the meeting revealed a leveling off in overall crime rates compared to previous months; however, retail thefts were high. Efforts to address this issue, with initiatives to combat retail theft and address concerns related to abandoned vehicles, were discussed.

Police are working with various stores, such as Walgreens, Target and others, to come up with crimefighting strategies, with the goal to keep these businesses open in the community. They are also working with the Brooklyn DA's office to request bail for recidivist shoplifters. Concerns were also raised regarding a notable increase in Acura vehicle thefts, indicating potential organized criminal activity targeting specific models.

The meeting also provided an opportunity for attendees to voice their concerns and ask questions. Topics ranged from illegal dumping to truck parking violations, with assurances from NYPD representatives and local officials that these matters would be addressed through coordinated efforts.

An update from Donald Cranston, on behalf of Williams' office, highlighted recent budget provisions and policies aimed at addressing retail theft, illegal pot shops and squatting.

Specifically, the definition of squatter and tenant has been revised, yet the assemblywoman advocates for further action by increasing penalties. Policies flagged as concerns, said Cranston, include those the assemblywoman voted against, which she believes should not have been part of the budget. These policies, dubbed by opponents as "the Big Ugly," encompass Good Cause Eviction, mayoral control, Sammy's Law (which advocates for lowering NYC's speed limit to 20 mph), and allocating \$2.4 billion for migrants.

The next meeting of the 63rd Precinct Community Council will be held at the John Malone Center at 7 p.m. on Wednesday, May 22nd.

#### NCOs Report "Perps" Responsible for Grand Theft Auto Finally Nabbed

On Thursday, April 18th, Neighborhood Coordination Officers (NCOs) Gunvinder Singh, Daniel Irving and Carlos Delgado conducted a Build the Block meeting for Sector A, at Holy Family/Ascend, 9719 Flatlands Avenue.

Sector A runs roughly from Ralph Avenue to Louisiana Avenue, and from Avenue D to Flatlands Avenue. NCO Singh reported that there was a rash of grand larcenies, which occurred in the vicinity of the E 105 St train station. Most involve snatching personal items such as jewelry. He also mentioned that several vehicles in the area had been broken into and valuables stolen. Singh cautioned against leaving items in vehicles, in full view, as that could attract criminals. He advised it would be wise to keep them out of sight – in the trunk or not leave them in the vehicle in the first place.


He said that they recently towed a whopping 47 cars "in Sector A alone" but warned that they've been made aware of a new trend where cars are being stolen by unauthorized tow trucks. He asked residents to call the police if they notice tow trucks without any decal picking up cars.

Singh also shared that three juveniles who were prolific in performing grand theft auto in the community had been apprehended and would remain incarcerated until sometime late next year. Their arrests have resulted in a significant drop in that crime. The news was received with relief.

He also stated that despite warnings, identity theft is on the rise. He mentioned that they receive three to four reports a day on the matter. The officer urged everyone to be careful with their personal information and to familiarize themselves with the safety tips in the Crime Prevention Handbook distributed at meetings by the NYPD.

Oh, the Things You'll See at P.S. 207's performance of *Seussical JR*.!

On Monday, April 15th, family, faculty and classmates gathered to watch Fillmore Academy Drama Club's evening performance of *Seussical JR*.

Throughout four productions, with two ensemble casts, "Blue Fish" and "Red Fish," P.S. 207 students showcased their talent on April 15th and April 17th, with the former cast performing on April 15th.

Seussical JR. is based on Dr. Seuss' works, mostly notably Horton Hears a Who!, but also incorporates elements from his other famous books, such as The Cat in the Hat, Yertle the Turtle and Other Stories and another of Horton's stories, Horton Hatches the Egg.

"It's a beautiful show with a beautiful message and with characters that can relate to everybody, said Kimberly Simek, the drama director. "Everyone has heard the story of *The Cat in the Hat*. Everyone knows *Horton Hears a Who!* and Mayzie, Sour Kangaroo and JoJo. So to put everybody all together in one – I think it's a very creative show."

True to its name, *Seussical JR*. boasts a set that is as colorful, eccentric and zany as possible. The production crew's meticulous work brings Dr. Seuss's whimsical drawings into the real world, adding a touch of magic to the show.

"I thought of what could be the most colorful in your face, kind of set design," said Antoinette Spada, art director. "We kind of just went with that because Dr. Seuss is over the top. The more that I thought of and the more that we imagined, the bigger it got and bigger and bigger until we got this."

Abigail Jablonski played Horton, the lead role, and gave a performance of an elephant trying to keep its head up despite all the obstacles it faces.

"I was shocked when I got the part. I wanted the part really bad, but it felt really good and I was excited for myself," said Jablonski. "Playing the role was so much fun, talking with the other Horton from the other cast and talking with my castmates, trying to work things out and make it all work."

*Seussical JR*. is the first production for the drama club as the NYC School Construction Authority had just finished working on the auditorium. As such, the crew had to practice in the school cafeteria.

"The cafeteria's dimensions were different from the stage," said Simek. "It was difficult to have entrances, exits and moving set pieces and for the kids to get a sense of where the audience would be, where they need to look, the lighting. It's been a challenge, but this group was adaptable, and I must give them so much credit for that. We found out one week ago that we would be able to be in this space, and they rose to the occasion incredibly well."

It felt like Hollywood in Canarsie when over 100 people attended the premiere of a powerful, anti-gun violence documentary, *Beyond the Silence: A Stand Against Gun Violence*, at the Hebrew Educational Society (H.E.S.), on Sunday, April 14th.

Answering the community's call to stand up against gun violence, the H.E.S. decided to create a mural and documentary about gun violence that could be used as an educational tool to build awareness among those most affected by random violent killings. The mural, painted in the center's main lobby, was completed by street artist Andaluz, known for his mural of Kobe Bryant and Gigi in Downtown Brooklyn, across from the Barclays Center. His new mural shows the beautiful faces of children, families and workers at the community center. The artist said it took him weeks to paint the mural, and he wanted

to capture the life and energy of the people within the H.E.S. community.

*Beyond the Silence* featured many of the young people who participate in activities at the H.E.S. The documentary came about after the building went on lockdown a few years ago, and they received a grant to support anti-violence efforts. H.E.S. Executive Director Moshit Rivkin instantly knew the best way to use the grant was to create a media production that could be shared with students across the city as a tool to advocate against gun violence.

Rivkin commissioned Terry Katz, a longtime filmmaker and current educator at the H.E.S., to produce the film. Katz has an extensive career in the entertainment industry spanning 40 years. His first documentary, *Pomonok Dreams*, shares the story of growing up in Pomonok, a NYCHA housing development, during the 1950s and 1960s. Katz has worked on a long list of movies and TV shows as an editor and producer, has taught at New York University and is now teaching film at the H.E.S.

When tasked with creating this documentary, he wanted to look at gun violence from a different angle. He told the *Canarsie Courier* he wanted this documentary to be a tool, not just another movie. During the film, Katz used statistics on mental health, fatherless homes and other data as to why young people lean toward gangs, which leads to gun violence. He also showed how the media



covers shootings in urban neighborhoods versus suburban neighborhoods, using interviews with young people from the H.E.S. to shape the documentary and help tell the story of the effects and ramifications of gun violence.

Not only were there interviews from students and staff of H.E.S., but Katz also blended in the voices of community leaders like Audrey Jackson, Executive Director of Shoot for the Stars Foundation and mother of rap artist "Pop Smoke;" Councilwoman Mercedes Narcisse; Harvey Gourdine, Community Activist; A.T. Mitchell, Founder and CEO of Man Up!; and David Youngblood, Outreach House Recreation Coordinator, to name a few. The documentary features many parts of Canarsie, and those who live here can identify with the environment of the documentary.

Rivkin plans on taking the documentary to different schools and colleges in the NYC area to open the discussion about gun violence in the hope it will touch those who are most impacted by it and those who could be involved with gun violence. The documentary explored the concept of gun violence being a means of economics for children whose parents are not at home because of work. Many of these kids find gangs or older role models who steer them in the wrong direction and misguide them to believe owning or using a gun will not affect them because they are so young. These are just some of the myths they are hoping to dispel in *Beyond the Silence*.

Following the screening, there was a vivid open discussion among guests. Families who lost their loved ones to gun violence were in attendance. Mrs. and Mr. Montrose, whose son Christian was killed in front of their home on East 104th Street on March 19th, were there sharing their hurt and pain, while members of the community rallied around them in support. A young girl in the audience shared that not only was she afraid when outside because of the shootings but also afraid when indoors because of school shootings.

The H.E.S. serves over 1,200 people from all walks of life daily, with food service, afterschool programs, job placement and much more. Originally a Jewish-only community center, the H.E.S. opened its doors to all people and religious backgrounds several years ago under the leadership of Marc Arje, the former Executive Director.






