community action and the unwavering commitment to fostering peace. As residents gathered to celebrate, they sent a powerful message that unity and resilience will always overcome adversity.



Shooting Leaves Three Men Wounded, Suspects on the Loose

A pair of gunmen struck three men with gunfire around 8 p.m. on Wednesday, June 26th, in the vicinity of East 93rd Street and Clarkson Avenue.

Officers from the 67th Precinct found a 23-yearold man with a gunshot wound to the left arm and a 24-year-old man with a gunshot wound to the right arm. EMS took both victims to an area hospital for treatment.

A 25-year-old man also walked into Brookdale Hospital with a gunshot wound.

The suspects fled on foot in an unknown direction. No arrests have been made.

Hate Graffiti in Local Park Sparks Community Action

Another disturbing incident of hate was discovered in a children's park in the heart of Marine Park, where antisemitic graffiti was found scrawled on playground equipment on Wednesday, June 26th.

Stephanie Benshimol, a concerned citizen and community activist, who was at Marine Park when authorities and elected officials arrived, recounted the tawdry tale. According to Benshimol, on Tuesday evening, June 25th, her friend was at the park with her kids when a few teenagers taunted them with chants of "Free Palestine" and "F Israel." This occurred while Jewish families were enjoying the park, and the very next morning the playground was filled with hateful graffiti.

Upon discovering this, Benshimol and community members took action, making phone calls that led to Assemblywoman Jaime Williams visiting the site to investigate. Williams, whose district includes the diverse Marine Park, promptly alerted the Parks Department. They quickly deployed staff to clean and paint over the hate-speech graffiti.

Benshimol expressed concern about the impact of such incidents on children, especially now that schools are out and the park is a popular spot for summer camps. She emphasized that Marine Park is a place for people of all colors, creeds and religions to enjoy, and incidents like this could spoil a season of fun. "This is a kids' park, where babies play, and it

should never have happened," she said.

Williams shared her dismay, noting, "It is very troubling to see antisemitic slurs written in our park situated between Marine Park JHS and the Carmine Carro Community Center. This park is enjoyed by many families and children of all ethnicities. I am thankful that the NYC Parks Department acted swiftly in removing these hateful signs. Although the signs were covered up, it is my duty to let the community know that this incident happened and we will not tolerate such hate. United we stand!"

Williams thanked the Canarsie Courier for covering the story and the president of the Marine Park Jewish Center for alerting the community, as well as a special thanks to Benshimol for reporting the hate crime and standing strong against it.

Caribbean Heritage Celebration Draws Hundreds to Canarsie

By Brenda Cox The adage, "It Takes a Village," was quite evident at the 4th Annual Caribbean American Heritage Celebration held at 1222 East 96th Street, on Saturday, June 22nd. Natives from everywhere in the Caribbean – Jamaica, Barbados, Guyana, Haiti, Grenada Carriacou and Petite Martinique, Trinidad and Tobago, St. Vincent and the Grenadines, Costa Rica and so many more Caribbean nations – turned out dressed in native island colors, proudly waving their national flags.

The food was everything Caribbean. Souse, pelau, jerk chicken, fried pork, black rice, dhalpourie, pine tarts, breads and coconut sugar cakes were just a sampling of the delectable delights that were dished out at the different island booths. A local DJ blasted calypso and soca music produced by Caribbean artists. Skinny Banton's "Wrong Again" was quite stirring.

There was a dance performance by the Grenada Cultural Dance Group, African drumming by Divine Explosion Art Program (D.E.A.P.), steel pan playing by Akinola Sennon and singing by Braata, a folk group.

Born in Trinidad, Assemblywoman Jaime Williams (AD 59) conferred a proclamation on businessman Calvin Sennon (also Trinidadian), proprietor of Trini-Jam and organizer of Celebrate Canarsie, for establishing Visit Canarsie, a nonprofit organization aimed at "strengthening the economic vitality, cultural richness and environmental sustainability of the Canarsie neighborhood."

Michael Brizan, Counsel General of Grenada Carriacou and Petite Martinique, and Andre Laveau, Counsel General of Trinidad and Tobago, were also on hand to celebrate the occasion with Williams, other Caribbean leaders and their constituents. Laveau invited everyone to Times Square on August 11th to celebrate World Steelpan Day, "an occasion that honors

the unique musical instrument invented in Trinidad and Tobago" by a native son, Winston "Spree" Simon.

A plethora of benefactors, including Congressman Hakeem Jeffries, State Senator Roxanne Persaud, Assemblywomen Jaime Williams and Monique Chandler-Waterman, District Leader Frank Seddio, the Newton Foundation, the 69th Precinct Community Council, Flatlands Civic Club, Inc. and the NYPD, collaborated to make the Caribbean Heritage Celebration possible.



BK and Queens Unite: Massive Caravan Rally Against Lease Renewal of Migrant Shelter at Floyd Bennett Field

Amid the upcoming renewal of a lease between the city and the National Park Service to house asylum seekers at Floyd Bennett Field (FBF), a massive New Yorkers First Caravan Rally organized by the Coalition for Better Communities (CBC) and local civic associations took place on Sunday, June 23rd, drawing residents from Brooklyn and Queens.

The large caravan drove through Marine Park, Mill Basin, FBF, over the Marine Parkway Bridge, through the Rockaways and back into Brooklyn.

The rally began in the Avenue U parking lot of Marine Park, where frustrated and energized residents, elected officials and candidates for office drove into the heart of FBF. They called on city leaders to shut down the problematic migrant tent city at the federal site. The massive caravan, adorned with U.S.

flags, descended on the site of the massive migrant shelter, demanding that City Hall not renew its lease.

"Illegals are being prioritized over New Yorkers, and many, many New Yorkers feel that this crisis is just not debatable, and there's no end in sight," stated Brenda Lee, a Marine Park resident and co-chair of the CBC.

Ron Canterino, co-chair of the CBC, and New Yorkers First group, expressed his gratitude to the participants. "We want to thank everyone who helped and came. It was outstanding-over 125 cars, 43 bikers, two big trucks and sound system by local DJ Ross [Faillace], who runs a non-profit for Back the Blue in support of the police," he said.

Assemblywoman Jaime Williams delivered a passionate speech at the rally, declaring, "Today, we're saying 'no more.' It's time that we take our com-

munity back, our city back, our state back," she said, sending a very clear message and urging our borders to be closed.

FBF is one of many shelters throughout the five boroughs, since the surge in arrival of asylum seekers sent to New York (a declared sanctuary city) overwhelmed the capacity to provide housing and support services.

Curtis Sliwa, head of the Guardian Angels and NYC mayoral contender, emphasized the non-political nature of the rally. "This isn't about politics," Sliwa said. "It's about what's right and wrong. This rally says we support immigration-legal immigration. It's not safe for the migrants. It's a floodplain, and it's horrible for the neighborhood and the quality of life. We're going to keep the pressure on until we close FBF.'

This caravan rally, months in the making, was a follow-up to a successful rally at Kings Plaza on April 14th (see "Brooklyn Unites: 'New Yorkers Come First' in Huge Rally at Kings Plaza," Canarsie Courier, April 18, 2024).

Queens Councilwoman Joann Ariola (D-32), who joined with Williams in the failed lawsuit to shut down the camp, told protesters, "We need to be able to go to our national park and enjoy it. That was taken from us this summer, and [the lease] must not be renewed."

Assemblyman Michael Novakhov (D-45), an immigrant himself, representing a district with many immigrants, emphasized that those who crossed the border illegally should be deported and urged elected officials to listen to the people.

Paul King, a candidate for Congress, echoed the sentiments of many participants. "It is so important for the people to speak up, even when the powers in D.C. don't care. They can either listen to the law-abiding, tax-paying citizens or we can fire them in November. Today, Brooklyn and Rockaway put them on notice."

Recently, Williams, King and Elizabeth Morrissey, president of the Madison-Marine-Homecrest Civic Association, testified in Washington, D.C. at a hearing opposing the lease renewal (see "Assemblywoman Williams Urges Non-Renewal of Floyd Bennett Field Lease Amid Migrant Crisis Impact," Canarsie Courier. June 20, 2024).

Elected Officials Collaborate to Educate About Juneteenth

On Tuesday, June 18th, the auditorium at P.S. 276 Louis Marshall School, 1070 East 83rd Street, was the scene of a special Juneteenth celebration organized by State Senator Roxanne Persaud (SD 19) and Assemblywomen Jaime Williams (AD 59) and Monique Chandler-Waterman (AD 58).

The event was held to commemorate the day, June 19th, when slavery ended in the United States. It was honored with a special prayer by the Honorable Melba Brown and speeches by elected officials, community leaders and special guest Anaya Lee Willabus. There were also dance performances and other dramatizations by P.S. 276 Queen Beez Steppers, African drumming and dance by Divine Explosion Arts Program (D.E.A.P.), poetry by the MLK Group, a reading by Joan Gilbert from Flatlands Civic Club, Inc. and a

fashion show of African outfits.

Williams told the audience that education should be a part of every Juneteenth celebration and explained that we can never forget our past. "I once heard it's important to dig up the past because in order for us to know our future, we have to go back into our past," she stated. "Today, we saw our youths singing and clapping and stepping, but the true meaning of Juneteenth is for us to educate! Educate! Because if we don't educate, we will not remember our past."

She referenced atrocities like the Tulsa Race Riots (or Black Wall Street Massacre as it's commonly known) and its lingering impact on black and brown communities today. She showed a short film titled, *Before They Die*, about the massacre and warned that our communities face the same threat of annihilation in the name of urban renewal, a "fancy word" for the City of Yes, proposed by Mayor Eric Adams.

"These things are created to systematically destroy communities like ours," Williams pointed out. "Communities that your grandparents, your mothers and your fathers have worked for all their lives, to purchase a home, to give you a chance in this community, to grow generational wealth," she stressed.

In their remarks, Persaud and Chandler-Waterman praised Williams for pulling the event together. The senator stated, "For our communities to survive, for our communities to thrive, we have to be willing to come together and do the thing that will build our community and that's what we're doing here today." Chandler-Waterman agreed and added, "We talk about our freedom, but our freedom is in every single one of you. It's in our hearts."

The group presented a citation for exemplary service to Tiffany Stewart, a Performing Arts Coach who has trained P.S. 276 Queen Beez steppers, among others.

Williams concluded her speech by saying, "We are a resilient people. We shall not be moved! And lastly, we treat each other with respect!"

The celebration was sponsored by the 69th Precinct Community Council and Flatlands Civic Club, Inc.

Learning About Crawling Critters "Inching Along"

Saturday's "Inching Along" event was curated by Brooklyn Public Library (BPL) Librarian Melissa McCarthy and MPA board member Margot Perron.
