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Historic Thomas Jefferson Democratic Club Headquarters Listed for Sale

The long-standing headquarters of the Thomas Jefferson Democratic Club (TJ Club) has been put on the market for \$1.5 million. Located at 77 Conklin Avenue in Canarsie, this historic site has served as the epicenter of local and national political Democrat strategy for decades. From fundraising for candidates to endorsing elected officials, the club has been a significant player in Brooklyn politics.

A storied past, the clubhouse, located between East 93rd and East 94th Streets, has been owned by a private corporation named after its address since 1966. The current president, Henry Bolus, at 90 years old, is a testament to the club's enduring influence. Former Brooklyn Democratic Party boss Frank Seddio, who presided over the club from 1992 until 1998 and served as Kings County party chair until 2020, remains a key figure in its operations.

Originally built as a Masonic temple over 120 years ago, the building was initially two separate houses combined into one by the Masons. It later became a Knights of Columbus (KOC) hall before being sold to the TJ Club in 1965. Major renovations were undertaken in 1967, resulting in the current structure.

According to Seddio, the Knights sold the building to the TJ Club in August 1965. The club took occupancy in January 1966, and major renovations were done, including the construction of the entire rear of the building, which remains today. By 1967, the club had fully moved in.

Preservationist Ira Kluger, co-President of the Canarsie Historical Society, expressed concerns about the potential demolition of the historic building. According to Kluger, the building was not erected in 1955 as some sources have stated. It appears in the 1939-1940

New York Tax Photo Collection, where it was listed as the Quadrant Club, a Masonic organization. The building was later occupied by the KOC before being acquired by the TJ Club.

Kluger noted that if one were to view the building from the rear, it is obvious that it consists of two separate houses joined together. Conklin Avenue was developed in the mid-1860s when the railroad first came to Canarsie, and the two houses were likely erected during the 1860s or 1870s. While the building may have been renovated in 1955, its origins are much older. As a staunch preservationist, Kluger deplores the possible demolition of this historic building and aims to alert local residents to its grave danger.

The political landscape of Brooklyn has evolved significantly since the club's inception. When the TJ Club moved to Conklin Avenue in 1966, the district lines were different, encompassing a broader area. Over the years, the district has shifted westward, with recent changes in 2022 reducing the club's influence in Canarsie. This geographical shift has prompted the club to seek a new location more central to the current district boundaries.

In a conversation with the Canarsie Courier, Seddio explained the rationale behind selling the building. "Number one, its location. It is directly, literally almost out of the district. We are across the street from the district and in the far east corner, and we want to be in the middle of the district, where we were originally," he said. "We are looking in the Old Mill Basin area for a new location for the TJ Club. We want to get back to that area so we can get the people from the western end of the district, who are unfamiliar with Canarsie, and start expanding our membership. Same thing with Mill Basin. They want to get more

people from the Mill Basin and surrounding areas in the district involved. We have less of Canarsie now."


Seddio emphasized the importance of relocating to better serve the community and expand membership. The club is considering properties in the Old Mill Basin area, aiming to reconnect with the western end of the district. The search for a new headquarters is focused on areas between Ralph and Utica Avenues around Avenue N.

The TJ Club has been instrumental in shaping Brooklyn's political scene. Its leadership has included prominent figures such as Senator Chuck Schumer and Congressman Hakeem Jeffries, as well as past New York State Assembly Speaker Stanley Finkel and Assemblyman Tony Genovesi. The club continues to be active, with regular meetings and ongoing political engagement.

Despite the impending sale, the club remains operational. They have scheduled their next meeting for August 15th, featuring a guest speaker from the Mayor's office. The club plans to continue its monthly meetings, eventually returning to weekly gatherings after Labor Day.

The sale of the Conklin Avenue property is expected to take some time, and the club intends to hold a farewell celebration before moving to its new location. The listing describes the property as a fully detached, legal one-family with office space and a finished basement. With a substantial opportunity for developers, according to the listing, the building could be converted into condominiums or multi-family housing.

The Thomas Jefferson Democratic Club's departure from its historic headquarters marks the end of an era. However, the club's commitment to fostering Democratic leadership and community involvement in Brooklyn ensures its legacy will continue in a new, modern facility.

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Police Looking for Double Shooting Suspect

The NYPD is asking for the public's assistance in identifying an individual wanted in connection to a double shooting that occurred at the Canarsie One Stop Market in June. Surveillance photos of the suspect have been released.

On Saturday, June 8th, around 11:10 a.m., an unidentified black male entered the market, at 8702 Avenue L, and discharged a firearm, striking a 77-year-old male victim in the right leg and a 23-year-old male victim in the right arm and abdomen (see "Two Shot Inside Canarsie Deli," Canarsie Courier, June 13, 2024). Both victims were taken by EMS to Brookdale

Hospital in stable condition.

The suspect fled in a dark-colored vehicle, heading eastbound on Avenue L, police said. He was last seen wearing a black face mask, a dark-colored hooded sweatshirt with white strings, light-colored sweatpants and light-colored sneakers.

Correction Officer Allegedly Shoots Homeless Man Following Dispute

A 19-year-old homeless man was arrested and charged with several crimes after he was shot in the abdomen around 12:40 p.m. on Sunday, August 4th, at 721 Snediker Avenue, between Dewitt Avenue and Linden Boulevard.

Police arrested Ryan Straker shortly after the incident occurred and charged him with attempted robbery, assault and criminal possession of stolen property. He was taken to Brookdale Hospital in stable condition, police said.

It's believed that there was a dispute between an offduty correction officer and Straker, which led to the officer allegedly shooting the undomiciled man. It's also believed that the homeless man was committing the aforementioned crimes and that the property belonged to the off-duty officer.

All concerts take place on the lawn near the bocce courts at 7 p.m. Bring a blanket, chair and your friends and family! For more information, call 718-252-2124.







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
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
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A Look Back at Canarsie's History - After Season Dance Given by Volunteer Life Guards - 1932


A Canarsie native named Douglas Torborg, now living in Florida, mailed an original program for a dance that took place in Canarsie in 1932, and it is our honor to share this piece of history with our readers. The occasion was the "After Season Dance Given by Volunteer Life Guards of Canarsie Beach," and the event took place on October 1, 1932 at the Arcadia Inn at the Canarsie Shore.

Douglas tells us that his father, Harold, was the Secretary for the dance, and his brother, Albert, was the Crew Commodore. Harold was born in Canarsie and lived there his entire life. He had polio and walked with a cane. Harold was nicknamed "Duck" because he was such a good swimmer. Duck was the manager of Heinrich's Bar and Restaurant, which was located at 135 Conklin Avenue until 1965.

A special thank you to Douglas Torborg for sharing this fascinating find with us, a 92-year-old pamphlet, which is in surprisingly good condition.

Ira Kluger, co-president of the Canarsie Historical Society, will be sharing historical facts about the advertisers in this pamphlet in a weekly column.

Di Paola, Inc. The history of the Di Paola funeral home is



somewhat unclear. Based upon newspaper advertisements, we know that from December 1, 1930 to November 16, 1931, the funeral home was initially located at 9501Glenwood Road. We are uncertain as to whether this was previously Mrs. Ripp's funeral home, which was located at Avenue G and East 95th Street, but did not have a precise street address. The 1939-1941 tax photos clearly indicate that the funeral home was located at 8824 Glenwood Road. We know that Di Paola's final location in Canarsie was at 9502 Glenwood Road. Thus, it appeared that the establishment relocated from 9501 Glenwood Road to 8824 Glenwood Road, and finally to 9502 Glenwood Road, which was its final location. However, the advertisement that appears in the Life Guards journal indicates that in 1932, Di Paola was already located at 9502 Glenwood Road, which, as I said, was their final location, throwing the above chronology into question. Discrepancies such as this, which are numerous, frustrate serious historical researchers beyond belief. Further research will obviously be required.

Dolly Beauty Shoppe According to the advertisement in the journal, the Dolly Beauty Shoppe was located at 1431 Rockaway Parkway, which was known as the Snelling Building. The fact that the advertisement states "Entrance on Glenwood Road" suggests that the beauty salon was located on the second floor. This building, which was erected prior to the turn of the century, originally housed Alonzo F. Snelling's drugstore on the first floor and multiple offices on the second floor. In recent years, the second floor of this building was sealed off, and the entire building has been allowed to deteriorate. I am extremely concerned about the fate of this historic building.

By May of 1958, the Dolly Beauty Shoppe had relocated to the second floor of 1414 Rockaway Parkway, above a five-and-ten-cent store.


Since assuming office in 2022, Narcisse has made it a tradition to bring movies to local parks, creating opportunities for families and neigh-

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Car and Package Theft Still a Problem in the 69th Precinct's Sector B

Sector B residents joined Neighborhood Coordination Officers (NCOs) Nicholas Baldeo, Daniel Irving, Carlos Delgado and Courtney Williams for a Build the Block meeting at Consuming Fire Ministries, 9623 Avenue L, on Thursday, August 1st, where they received updates specific to their sector as well as citywide crime patterns and quality of life issues.

NCO Baldeo told attendees that over the most recent 28-day period (July 1st to July 28th), there were 10 major crimes in the 69th Precinct's Sector B, which covers East 94th Street to East 108th Street, from Flatlands Avenue to Seaview Avenue. The crimes included four grand larcenies, three grand larceny autos and three assaults.

Sector B has a large number of commercial businesses, and Baldeo said there is a lot of theft at the CVS on Flatlands Avenue and East 103rd Street. With the closures of

both Rite Aids in Canarsie, many fear that this pharmacy may also close if crime does not decrease.

As the area is also residential, package theft – items stolen from the porches of people's homes – is another issue. Baldeo said when perpetrators from outside Canarsie see nice homes, and not a lot of people on the street, those homes become targets. The NCOs suggested investing in a security or a Ring camera, which also helps police when conducting investigations and has led to several arrests.

One rather unusual grand larceny involved the theft of a refrigerator that was being delivered to a store at Seaview Plaza. Baldeo said that while the truck containing the refrigerator was behind the store, waiting to be unloaded, a random truck pulled up to the location and the driver took off with the large appliance.

Car theft of Kias and Hyundais, and recently Acuras,

continues to be a problem in Canarsie, and Sector B is no exception, but thieves are stealing luxury cars, like Mercedes Benzs, from that sector. The culprits break the side window of the vehicle and take the car for a joy ride, but once they park the car, they can't start it up again.

NCO Irving explained that all the patrol cars have license plate readers and that's how they recover the stolen vehicles. NCO Williams suggested investing in a steering column lock, like The Club, as Kias and Hyundais have USB ports within the steering column, and all a thief has to do is insert a USB into the port to start the car.

Irving also said they hope to see a decrease in vehicle theft because one car thief was recently arrested.

Over 100 abandoned cars have been towed from the 69th Precinct this year. NCO Delgado said that they plan on targeting large trucks that park along East 108th Street, but it's not as easy to do a "heavy tow" because they have to schedule the tow operation one or two weeks in advance.

Thanks to Operation Padlock, almost 850 illegal smoke shops across the city have been shut down, but we have not seen any closures in Canarsie. Baldeo said that the city is going after the big operations first and that the 11 smoke shops in the 69th Precinct are not being investigated yet. He was in touch with a Public Safety Agent, who said he gave information on the Canarsie shops to an Inspector, and they are going to try and get someone to come to Canarsie and investigate the illegal shops.

Other gripes included unsightly graffiti (please contact your NCO directly to remove graffiti) and the prevalence of unlicensed scooters driving around the neighborhood, to which Irving replied that they are not allowed to chase them, as a civilian could get injured in the process. "The only way we can get them is when they are gassing up."

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School District 22: in Compliance with Class Size Mandates, Looking to Future

their July 2nd meeting, members of Community District Education Council 22 (CEC 22) decided to reschedule for Monday evening, July 29th. The group convened in person at the District Office, located at 5619 Flatlands Avenue, but also streamed the meeting live via Zoom to the public.

The highlight of the meeting was a presentation given by Jyoti Folch-Berman of the Department of Education's Office of District Planning. Folch-Berman explained that her department works in partnership with CECs, superintendents, the School Construction Authority, School Design, Student Enrollment and many other offices to assess district needs and develop strategic plans to address them.

In the case of District 22 (D22) specifically, she shared data indicating a 9% decrease in the total number of school-aged residents since the 2018-2019 school year. During this same time period, the K-5 residential population in D22 showed the highest decline across all grade levels at roughly 11%; 6-8 residential population declined by 9%, and 9-12 experienced the least decline of 5%. Over the last five years, the number of middle schoolaged residents in D22 decreased by almost 9%. During that same time period, a smaller portion of D22 residents enrolled in D22 district schools and a slightly larger portion enrolled in charter schools and non-public

If there was an increase in residents and a decrease in enrollment, it might be a cause for concern, but this kind of decrease in residency could actually have a positive impact on the District, when it comes to further compliance with class size reduction mandates. As it stands, D22 already has 535 excess elementary school seats, 1,873 excess middle school seats and four low-enrolled elementary schools (P.S. 326, P.S. 245, P.S. 198, and P.S.

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
After experiencing technical difficulties at al students if zoning lines are redrawn. While Folch-Berman and D22 Superintendent Julia Bove both agreed that D22 was able to meet the benchmark 20% compliance last year and will meet this year's benchmark 40% compliance, with no problem, Folch-Berman could not rule out truncation of K-8 schools nor the possibility of some rezoning in the future.

> She explained that while many families love the convenience and continuity of K-8 schools, they can be cumbersome for one principal to manage. With so many students in one building, there often isn't not enough physical space to spread kids thin enough to meet new class size mandates, which may

277) that have the capacity to serve addition- eventually necessitate truncation (dividing one K-8 school into two schools - a K-5 and a 6-8). She also said that there are a number of very high-quality, high demand schools in D22 (P.S. 197, P.S. 195, P.S. 236, P.S. 255, P.S. 254, J.H.S. 234, J.H.S. 278, and M.S. 890 for example). Some are zoned, others are non-zoned and some have gifted and talented programs, where losing seats to comply with class size mandates would face major pushback from parents. Folch-Berman assured the group that while she could not predict how things would shake out in the next few years, they would be an integral part of the discussion and included in the decision-making processes.

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
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
