### **Ahoy! A Seafaring Adventure Awaits Aboard the Nellie Bly**

By Loretta Chin With a buy one, get one free Labor

Day weekend special, it was the perfect time to take a guest for a sightseeing cruise on Sheepshead Bay's latest nautical offering aboard the Nellie Bly, an elegant 50-foot, passenger tour boat that initially set sail from Pier 9 in mid-July, offering weekly tours of the Coney Island shoreline.

Coney Island native and former NYC tugboat company captain and owner, Gerard Thornton, founded the Coney Island Steamboat Company and took Nellie Bly, a classic and historic wooden motor launch, for its inaugural sail on July 13th from the pier located at 2124 Emmons Avenue.

Built in 1944, the open air, canopycovered tour boat is one of the oldest running wooden passenger vessels in America. It originally hailed from down South and was used as a launch to transport sailors to their ships.

Beginning at Sheepshead Bay, the seaworthy craft, certified and inspected by the U.S. Coast Guard, steered around Kingsborough Community College to Manhattan Beach, Brighton Beach, Coney Island, Gravesend Bay and Jamaica Bay, with many points of interest in between.

On Sunday, September 1st, the Nellie Bly set out again with about two dozen passengers. Captain Thornton introduced himself and his crew and went over safety advisories prior to departure. "We'll be talking along the way about the history and the people that made this area very special," Thornton said. His partner, Michael Carr, helped narrate the latest tour as he told of the rich history of the people, places and littleknown stories behind these beachfront communities along the way.

Highlights included the early settlement of the Lenape Indians and the arrival of the Dutch and British; the storied past of infamous gangsters and the rich and famous people who were once drawn to the area; Coney Island's lighthouse, Steeplechase Pier and iconic amusement park; an alternative energy development project; and more.

Passengers told the captain how they found the cruise enjoyable, informative and educational, applauding him for a job well done as the boat returned to the dock.

The boat is named after Nellie Bly, the pen name for Elizabeth Cochrane, a pioneering female journalist and investigative reporter best known for her 1887 exposé on the conditions of asylum patients on Blackwell's Island in NYC and for her report of her recordbreaking 72-day trip around the world.

The tour boat accommodates up to 49 people, offers sunset cruises on Friday nights, and weekend cruises from July to the beginning of October, weather permitting, with trips as low as \$25 for seniors and military. For more information, visit https://coneyislandsteamboat.com/

### Woman's Wallet Stolen from Car in Canarsie



### District 22 Ranks High in Areas of Citywide School Survey

Members of Community District Education Council 22 (CEC 22) convened at the District 22 office, located at 5619 Flatlands Avenue, on Tuesday evening, September 3rd, for their first meeting of the 2024-2025 school year, which was also streamed live via Zoom.

Superintendent Julia Bove announced that the previously embargoed ELA (English Language Arts) and Math state test scores had finally been released, and she presented Department of Education graphs showing student progress over the last 10 years. While the data indicated that ELA proficiency took a slight dip this year, students scored higher in math proficiency this year than they had in the last decade. The ability to compare this year's scores to that of previous years was limited, however, since Math and ELA tests were aligned to new standards starting in 2023, were not administered in 2020 and were optional in 2021, due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The superintendent also announced that the results of the 2024 NYC School Survey, administered from February 12, 2024 to April 19, 2024, had also become available and were posted at schools. nyc.gov/about-us/reports/school-quality/ nyc-school-survey. Every year, families, teachers and staff of grades 3-K through 12, and students in grades 6-12, take the

NYC School Survey, the results of which give school leaders a better understanding of what members of their school community think about the school. The information collected by the survey is designed to support a dialogue among all members of the school community about how to make their school a better place to learn.

The results of this year's survey boded well for a number of popular District 22 schools, as Parent-Principal trust was ranked quite high -94% at J.H.S. 14 Shell Bank, 95% at J.H.S. 78 Roy H. Mann and 94% at I.S. 234 Arthur W. Cunningham. When it came to the school's commitment to safety, Shell Bank also ranked high at 96%, as did Roy H. Mann at 95% and P.S. 109 at 95%. Beyond the District, from a larger, citywide perspective, other areas that show a need for improvement include the meals offered in cafeterias, social emotional learning, bullying prevention, and safety from gang-related activities and illicit drug use that students report are occurring in their schools. So while District 22 has much to be proud of, the city as a whole leaves much to be desired. Only when students feel safe and supported can they learn and grow to reach their full potential.

The next meeting of CEC 22 will be held on Tuesday, October 1st, at 6:30 p.m., location to be announced.



### **Caravan Rally Against Floyd Bennett Lease Renewal**

On Sunday, September 8th, residents gathered for a caravan rally, organized by the Coalition for Better Communities, to protest the lease renewal for Floyd Bennett Field (FBF), where migrant shelters were set up last fall. Starting in Marine Park, the caravan passed through Mill Basin before stopping inside the national recreation area.

The rally comes amid growing frustration over the city's response to the ongoing migrant crisis. Since the spring of 2022, over 180,000 migrants have arrived in New York City, requiring housing and support, funded by taxpayer dollars.

Ron Canterino, Chair of the New Yorkers First group, kicked off the rally, urging those in attendance to get out and vote in the upcoming elections and hold those in power accountable for "destroying our city."

Assemblywoman Jaime Williams, a leading voice against the lease renewal, expiring on September 14th, urged officials to prioritize New Yorkers over migrants. "We have urged the governor and mayor not to renew this lease," Williams said. "We've had enough of our communities being neglected while the city pours resources into supporting illegal migrants." On June 13th, she testified at hearings in Washington, D.C. (see "Assemblywoman Williams Urges Non-Renewal of Floyd Bennett Impact," Canarsie Courier, June 20, 2024).

Williams represents the 59th Assembly District, where FBF is located. She pointed to the rise in public safety issues, with increased panhandling and thefts in the area, reflecting the audacity of prioritizing migrants over taxpayers. "We cannot accept this as the norm," she exclaimed.

According to Williams, over 1,000 people have signed petitions urging city officials to revoke the lease. The rally follows a successful caravan protest held on June 23rd, where residents from Brooklyn and Queens united in opposition to the city's migrant policies (see "BK and Queens Unite: Massive Caravan Rally Against Lease Renewal of Migrant Shelter at Floyd Bennett Field," Canarsie Courier, July 4, 2024).

Curtis Sliwa, founder of the Guardian Angels, WABC radio host, and former and future candidate for Mayor, joined the fight at the rally. Sliwa has long been critical of the city's handling of the crisis, particularly the decision to house thousands of migrants in FBF, sounding the alarm in advance of the city's intention to open the tent shelter.

"We have veterans and homeless people in need, but instead, our tax dollars are being spent on migrants," Sliwa said, referring to failed open borders policy. He linked what he called a pattern of corruption within city and state government to the bait-andswitch tactics used for migrant hotels, as New Yorkers suffer the consequences.

Assemblymen Alec Brook-Krasny and Michael Novakhov echoed concerns over the migrant crisis. Novakhov, of neighboring Assembly District 45, highlighted the secrecy surrounding migrant shelters being opened in Brooklyn. "They lied to us," he said.

Brooklyn Conservative Party Chair Fran Vella-Marrone commended Williams' leadership, urging people to vote in November "to elect leaders who will fight for common sense and put New Yorkers first."

As the rally dispersed, the caravan was invited to join ongoing protests at the proposed shelter on 86th Street and 25th Avenue to show solidarity.

Residents sent a clear message – they will not stand by as the city uses taxpayer money for migrants over citizens. With the lease expiration looming, the fight to stop the renewal of FBF continues.



and Restaurant, which was located at 135 Conklin the Evarts family occupied the house from the 1920s into the 1960s. The Evarts family was prominent in Canarsie, and the late Dick Evarts operated a bar on Rockaway Parkway near Glenwood Road. Following his death, his widow, Marge Evarts, continued to operate the bar until the early 1950s, when the entire row of stores occupying the site was demolished for the construction of the Greenpoint Savings Bank. The site is now occupied by the Capital One Bank.

Fred A. Brimlow: With the advent of Prohibition in 1919, the barroom in the historic Abraham's Hall, at Conklin Avenue and East 95th Street, was forced to close. According to the late renowned historian, John F. Denton, Fred Brimlow subsequently rented the former barroom and established a printing shop there. (Some older Canarsiens may recall the building, which was located at 135 Conklin Avenue, and has since been demolished, as the Knights of Columbus headquarters.) It is believed but, to my knowledge, undocumented that, at some point in time, Mr. Brimlow maintained his printing business in a storefront on Glenwood Road near Rockaway Parkway, which he shared with the wellknown signmaker, Gustav (Gus) Richter.

Interestingly, at another point in time, Mr. Richter's sign shop shared the storefront at 9203 Flatlands Avenue with the office of the Canarsie Courier. From 1935 to 1942, Mr. Brimlow was employed as a pressman at the Courier. In 1957, Mr. Brimlow, an avid boater and fisherman, who, in 1925, was recognized for rescuing four young boys stranded in a rowboat during a severe storm, died aboard a boat immediately after being announced as the winner of a fishing contest in which he caught the largest fish. I find it odd that although the advertisement in the journal identifies Mr. Brimlow as a printer, it does not specify, even vaguely, the location of his place of business. As Prohibition did not end until 1933, I presume that in 1932, when the journal was published, Mr. Brimlow's printing business still occupied the former barroom.

Sunrise Radio Shop: Unfortunately, no informa-

tion whatsoever regarding the Sunrise Radio Shop itself exists. However, we do have some information regarding the storefront at 9318 Avenue L, which it occupied. Although the data is vague, it appears that in 1921 it may have been occupied by Lew and Emma Cahn's real estate and insurance office. We do know that Mr. and Mrs. Cahn in later years maintained their place of business at 9615 Avenue L, a building believed by some to be a former schoolhouse. Interestingly, when the Cahns occupied 9615, the *Canarsie Courier* rented a desk in their office and established a branch office there, enabling the merchants occupying stores along Avenue L to place advertisements without traveling to the *Courier's* main office.

The storefronts of 9316 and 9318 Avenue L were at some point in time combined into one large store, which was occupied by a series of discount stores, including Ben Franklin Stores, and M. and J. Stores, Inc., which later evolved into Kenny's Department Store. Following Kenny's relocation to the opposite side of Avenue L, 9316-9318 was occupied by Slavin's Fish Market, which later evolved into Cocose's Fish Market. The respective fish markets shared the storefront with a succession of food-related businesses, including Parkway Kosher Meats, later known as Cherry's Kosher Meat Market, Save-Rite Discount Dairy, and a fruit and vegetable store known as Big Apple Fruits and Vegetables, later known as Fruit Trail. Subsequently, 9316 and 9318 were subdivided into two separate stores, with the store of interest, 9318, being occupied by Fix Phone Now, a mobile phone repair shop, followed by a Boost Mobile store, which, for a short period of time, shared the storefront with an income tax return preparation service. Subsequently, the adjacent Country Butcher recombined 9316 and 9318 into a single storefront, expanded their business into it and remains the current occupant. As an aside, the constant combination, subdivision and recombination of adjacent storefronts makes this type of research extremely frustrating and almost impossible to accomplish.
