Bell to Bell, No Cell: New School Policy

As summer winds down in Canarsie, families are sharpening pencils, ironing uniforms and preparing for another school year. But this fall brings something new: under Chancellor's Regulation A-413, New York City schools are banning the use of personal cell phones and internet-enabled devices during the school day.

Starting this September, students may still bring their phones, tablets or smartwatches to school — but once the first bell rings, they must be stored until dismissal. Schools will decide how — whether in lockers, sealed pouches or other systems. The goal is simple: create "distraction-free schools" where students can focus on learning, friendships and in-person experiences without constant pings and scrolling.

For many educators, this is welcome

news. Teachers have long struggled against buzzing phones in class, and parents worry about cyberbullying or the pressures of social media. Limiting devices, supporters argue, gives children space to engage more fully in school life.

The Department of Education has built in exceptions. Students with medical needs, IEPs or language translation requirements may still use their devices. Schools must also provide a reliable way for parents to reach children during the day. But specifics will vary by school, and parents will need to review local policies closely.

There will be challenges, no doubt. Teenagers losing access during lunch may feel cut off, and enforcing rules consistently won't be easy. Yet there's also opportunity here: classrooms where teachers no longer compete with TikTok, cafeterias filled with conver-

sation instead of glowing screens and recess yards buzzing with games.

As we begin the school year, families should stay informed, ask questions and engage with their school about how this policy will work in practice. For a few hours each day, our children may rediscover what it means to be fully present — with classmates, with teachers and with themselves.

District 22 — Back to School Vision Screening Vital to Success

As families across the district prepare to start the new school year in just a few short weeks, there is so much to be mindful of.

District 22 Superintendent Julia Bove shared some of those key details with families during Community District Education Council 22's (CEC 22) calendar meeting on Tuesday, August 5th, held at the District Office, located at 5619 Flatlands Avenue.

The superintendent reminded families that August is Children's Eye Health and Safety Month and discussed how having a proper vision screening each year is vital to a student's academic success. If untreated, poor vision can hinder a student's progress, cause their test scores to suffer, and may lead to frustration, alienation and an aversion to school in general.

The most common vision problems

among school-aged children are astigmatism (blurred or distorted vision caused by an abnormal curvature of the cornea or lens), myopia (nearsightedness) and hyperopia (farsightedness), all of which can be corrected by wearing glasses. Even students who already wear glasses can benefit from an annual screening, which will ensure their prescription is up to date.

Unfortunately, most kids with vision problems have no idea that there is something wrong; they think they see what everyone else sees. Unless they are squinting or complaining of frequent headaches, it's common for their parents to overlook the problem as well. It is often a highly perceptive teacher who first recognizes the problem, when a student suddenly struggles to read what is on the board or cannot follow along in a textbook, and recommends an eye test.

Bove also encouraged families to visit

https://www.schools.nyc.gov/about-us/ policies/cell-phone-and-electronicdevice-policy, prior to Thursday, September 4th, (the first day of the 2025-26 school year) to review the Department of Education's Device Policy. She explained that in accordance with New York State Law and Chancellor regulations, intended to create a distractionfree learning environment, students will not be permitted to use personal internet-enabled electronic devices during the school day, which includes cell phones, laptops, tablets, and portable music and entertainment systems. Families should reach out to their child's school principal or parent coordinator with any questions regarding the device policy and implementation at their child's individual school.

The next meeting of CEC 22 will be held on Tuesday, September 2nd, at 6:30 p.m. at the District Office.

East Flatbush Man Loses Home Over \$600 Water Bill, Leaders Call for Change

Try to imagine paying off your home, building a life for over three decades and waking up in the middle of the night to strangers showing up with a locksmith and drilling out your lock because your house was sold — for a measly \$5,000.

That's what happened to East Flatbush resident Filmore Brown, whose more than 30-year home was auctioned off last December through New York City's lien sale program. His debt? An overdue water bill that his attorney says began at just \$600 in 2019.

The bill was determined by the city at the height of the pandemic — without Brown's knowledge — and without the kind of oversight or community checks that would have caught the error. "Everything happened out of my client's view and out of view of other people who could have helped," Nicholson said. "If



we're not providing seniors and homeowners with year-round assistance to navigate paperwork, exemptions and notices, then we're not really serious about protecting Black and Brown homeowners. Seniors have a right to be cautious about scams, but that fear often means they miss or ignore official mail. The result is devastating — not just for one family, but for the entire block, as the loss of one home drags down the value and stability of the surrounding neighborhood."

There was a press conference in front of Brown's home on August 15th. Local groups like the Hebrew Educational Society (H.E.S.) and Level Up stood with him in support, calling for change.

Brown, who insists he never received notice of the debt, refers to losing his house over such a small amount as nothing short of an injustice. City departments have defended the sale, stating that multiple notices were sent by mail. They argue lien sales are a mechanism that has to be utilized in order to keep the city's sewer and water system solvent — stating that if they did not, other residents would have to pay more.

But the anger is growing. The lien sale system has already been labeled predatory and broken by NYC Public Advocate Jumaane Williams. At the Friday press conference, Assemblywoman Monique Chandler-Waterman and Councilman Chris Banks joined Brown in pledging to advance legislation that would ban the sale of homes over unpaid water bills — condemning the practice as immoral and devastating.

This is an issue of dignity," Nicholson stated. "It's an issue of allowing seniors to age in place without the fear of losing everything based on a clerical error or a notice that they didn't receive. We can't claim to love our communities and allow homes to be taken for pennies on the dollar."

The timing is especially jolting. Last week, Brooklyn District Attorney Eric Gonzalez announced the conviction of a disbarred attorney who stole deeds of 11 Brooklyn homes in a decade-long scheme targeting minority homeowners. That case makes clear how precarious homeownership can be in communities like East Flatbush, where decades of savings and hard work can be erased in an instant.

Brown's case is at the center of a much larger argument: who really benefits from lien sales, and how much longer can New York City sustain a system that strips homeowners of generational wealth over debts that, in many cases, are smaller than the cost of a month's rent?


They also prayed for the military, peace and safety in Canarsie, prosperity for all area businesses, the youths, as well as the Nation and its leaders, that they would make good decisions.

He told the Canarsie Courier, "Sister Scott has done a remarkable job here and has set certain initiatives in place, such as our Harvest celebrations. We wanted to honor her today and every day."

Born in Guyana on August 4, 1925, Scott was the fourth of seven children and the oldest daughter. Scott met her late husband and married in 1944. Together, they raised 10 children and have countless grandchildren and greatgrandchildren.

Scott has devoted her life to serving others. Her mother encouraged her to pursue a career, and Scott chose nursing. However, after her mother's early passing, she had to leave that career to take on family responsibilities. "I had to take full responsibility within the home. CEC 18 Discusses Back-to-School Topics

It's that time of the year again ... Back to School! A new air conditioning law and cell phone policies were the topics of discussion at the Community Education Council 18 (CEC 18) meeting on Monday, August 4th, held at the District 18 office, located at 1106 East 95th Street.

CEC 18 2nd Vice President Rashida Lawrence Dyar reviewed and discussed the NYS and NYC Public Schools air conditioning law, information that parents and guardians need to know concerning the upcoming school year. She explained that if a classroom has a temperature of 88 degrees Fahrenheit, principals will relocate students to a cooler area. If there isn't a cooler

a "snow day," and students would be dismissed. Dyar asked how that would be implemented and wondered if there would be loss of instruction. Another member also mentioned how bad the heat affects asthmatic students, as well as students with other health issues.

Superintendent Celeste Terry explained that while it's important to have a Plan B (where students will be placed if the temperature becomes too high), it's crucial to make sure that all schools have an adequate number of air conditioners. She pointed out that it would seem easy to procure and install some air conditioners; however, they must be purchased and in-

environment available, it could be treated like stalled by Department of Education (DOE) vendors. It's not as simple as going to BJ's or ordering from Amazon. Terry also mentioned that no schools have been dismissed due to heat.

> She announced that there will be changes to cell phone policies for the 2025-2026 school year as part of an initiative by the DOE and Governor Kathy Hochul to create a distractionfree learning environment. Students will not be permitted to have any personal internetenabled electronic devices from "bell-to-bell," from the start of the day to the end (including after-school activities). You could hear the audible sound of shock heard around the room. All parents felt the sudden immense panic of the thought of not being able to get in touch with their child in the event of an emergency. Terry, being a mother herself, acknowledged the fear immediately.

> The superintendent shared that there is a district-wide cell phone plan, but each school will have ways to modify the plan - for example, by choosing the way that phones will be stored (pouches, lockers, etc.). Students who require an internet-enabled device due to health or educational reasons are permitted to use their devices. Terry suggested that parents inquire about their child's particular policy. To look up your child's school cell phone policy, visit ny.gov/phonefree.


> As far as not being able to contact your child during the day, in case of an emergency, there will be a direct phone number that families can call. Terry recognized that policies and plans will be reviewed and finalized before the start
